THE FIRST ALPHONSIAN YOUTH GATHERING 2024

The enchanting island of Sumba, Indonesia, became a vibrant epicenter of faith, culture, and connection during the First ASIOC Alphonsian Youth Gathering in Weetebula, Indonesia held from 30th June to 6th July 2024. From the moment we arrived, the locals greeted us with unparalleled warmth, singing, and dancing at the airport, setting the tone for what would become a life-changing experience for the 600+ participants from diverse nations.

The gathering, themed "One Encounter, One Family, One Mission," was officially declared open by Fr. Rogerio Gomes C.Ss.R., Superior General, accompanied by Fr. Ivel Mendanha C.Ss.R. and Fr. Paul Vinh C.Ss.R.,General Consultor for Asia-Oceania, along with Fr. Yoakim C.Ss.R and

Fr. Jack C.Ss.R.

Our journey began with a three-day homestay with Sumbanese families. Despite language barriers, the universal language of love connected us, reminding us of our shared devotion to Our Mother of Perpetual Help.

Beginning with the vibrant 4-kilometer parade in Weetebula, the Alphonsian Youth Gathering 2024 set the tone for the week filled with energy, faith, and unity. National flags waved proudly as cheers echoed through the streets, celebrating the diversity and spirit of the Redemptorist family. From the parade to cultural presentations that showcased Indonesia's rich heritage, every moment brought us closer as one family.

The gathering was enriched by thought-provoking sessions and inspiring talks. Fr. Rogerio Gomes, Superior General, called us to be "Young Missionaries of Hope," urging us to root our mission in God's word and extend it globally. Fr. Paul Vinh challenged us to embrace humility and service in our journey, while Fr. Ivel Mendanha brought the story of St. Clement to life, inspiring us to persevere in our call despite obstacles. These powerful sessions reminded us of the profound mission we share as Redemptorist youth.

On the second day, the Confederation of India celebrating Mass, was a moment that resonated deeply with many. One of the highlights was the AYG Theme Song, an energetic and vibrant composition by the Indonesians. For the closing Mass, Fr. Edward Joseph C.Ss.R., our beloved Provincial, reminded us that each one of us was not here by chance but had been called and chosen by God. The celebration included heartfelt thanksgiving and speeches by the organizing team, followed by the symbolic handover of the AYG cross. The Indonesian youth faithfully passed the cross to the Philippines, who received it with great enthusiasm, marking the transition with joyful dancing. A solemn procession led to a final bonfire, where we placed our hopes into the flames, and fireworks lit up the night sky, bringing AYG 2024 to a memorable close.

We arrived as strangers, but we left as family. The friendships forged in Sumba, the lessons learned, and the love shared will forever remain etched in our hearts. We continue to connect with our foster families and new friends from around the globe through video calls, cherishing these relationships. The next AYG in the Philippines in 2026 is eagerly anticipated, a beacon of hope for our reunion.

This enriching and enlightening programme, now in its 26th episode, attracts viewers from across the globe as it tackles a two-pronged, universal issue : the concerns of the Aged and the concern for the Aged. Ageing Gracefully is a platform for a healthy discussion of the myriad issues connected with the inexorable march of time, with inputs from diverse professionals associated with this demographic. Fr. Juventius Andrade C.Ss.R. has, in his own words, "been the unbroken thread" through all the episodes of this programme, shaping, directina, steering conversations, to afford clarity on a sensitive issue.



series on The three part Supervised Care dealt with that important decision : Family Home care or Institutional Home care? This deceptively simple topic revealed layers of complications and sensitive issues. On the panel were Dr. John Tarakan of St. John's Hospital and Sr Reena Phillips, SSPS (Missionary Sisters of the Holy Spirit), with Fr. Juventius Andrade CSsR as the Anchor.



Discussion, discerning and deciding on care at home or at an institution "is a process not an event", said Fr. Andrade. Imperative is that the Seniors make the decision freely and without coercion.

Moving to a Senior Home is always a difficult decision, both for the person(s) and the family. Each approaches it from a different perspective. But as was pointed out: "the main concern here is not where the Seniors are going, but will they be provided care in an environment where are respected". they Conversation is the key to resolving these issues and the goal peace for the Seniors in their twilight years and for the Family.

The discussions were far ranging: From the benefits and challenges of living in an Institutional Home, to the roles of the Stakeholders (Seniors, Family, Society, Institution), the four prongs of discernment, financial aspects most important, and the changing mindset of Seniors. Testimonials from the audience from both sides of the fence led weight to the issues discussed.

Repository Of Wisdom

Pope Francis: "The elderly are the repository of wisdom, of experience ,and we should draw upon that and not lay it aside."

Fr. Juventius Andrade CSsR : "The Cathoic Church in its teachings and the many documents that have come from the Vatican insisted on the remarkable care we need to give to our elders; We cannot treat them as a disposable culture. Pope Francis has highlighted this many times".

A parting thought:"It is our privelege to walk with our parents in their hour of frailty as they did with us in our hour of need. Always with God's grace and God's assistance".

Brain Pickers



In this episode of the series, we are introduced to a fascinating look at the intersection of faith and personal life from one who was born a non-beilever, one whose faith "receeded into the wallpaper of his life" and one who remained steadfast to his faith despite the frighteningly changing landscape. No three persons could be more different, yet the common thread was "God always has a plan, always. You only have to say yes."

For this professional musician, born into a non-believer family in the Netherlands, his faith "is still a mystery that is unfolding". Fr. Albert van der Woerd, Pastor of St. Mark's Catholic Church in Venice, Los Angeles, says that a chance encounter with a choir in a catholic church led him to discover the Holy Spirit, who showed him that "the source of all that good music is Faith in Christ". As he travelled across the globe from Kenya to Holland and the USA, he realised that "Christ taught me the whole idea of being a human...and there is a dimension of humanity that only He can provide...I got to know a world, intimately, that I did not know existed."

Deacon Charlie Echeverry, A Lay Deacon (married Deacon) from Colombia, currently in the US, is a self confessed "Cultural Christian...who was a causulty in the vortex of secularism". His "unchurched" wife Jessica experienced "a Saint Paul moment" and he explains, "as I was communicating with her, God was sneakily teaching me; and I got an understanding of what I had always had just never understood or appreciated". With his dramatic "reversion" to Christ and the faith, This Permanent Deacon found, through his Deaconate and ministry of the media "to tell the story of the Gospel in a better way".

The above two interviews were conducted by Fr. Charles Vijay C.Ss.R.

Fr. Seamus Enright C.Ss.R, from Limerick, Ireland, was an absoute delight as he dialogued gently but with startling frankness about "a repressive, controlling church... brought to its knees, but then again that's where the church should be – on its knees". Injustice, inequality and poverty are non-negotiables in this good man's vocabulary. Having worked in three continents for almost 50 years, Fr Enright has kept pace by finding "a new way of being a Redemptorist". Fr. Enright is credited with having built up a hugh international congregation during Covid, with 24x7 streaming that saw innovative programmes like religious reading with Muslims and celebrating Blue Christmas (for the lost and lonely). "When you have a common cause you can forge a relationship with people across all social and religious divides", he says.

In persuance of Pope Francis' Universal Synod that seeks to create a welcoming and participative Church; He urges the ordained to "come down from your pedestal and get out of the sacristy..and through explicit proclamation and concrete social action, to preach the Gospel to widen people's horizons as Jesus did, to promote inclusivity."

Fr. Juventius Andrade C.Ss.R. adroitly handled this very interesting and potentially explosive interview.

Celebrating Faith and Unity:

In July, I had the privilege of attending the Alphonsian Youth Gathering in Sumba, Indonesia, organized by the Asia-Oceania Redemptorists. The youth's passion and enthusiasm for their faith was truly inspiring, sparking an idea: Why not channel this vibrant energy into a Global Novena to St. Alphonsus Liguori in preparation for his feast on August 1st? This would be an opportunity to unite youth from across the world in prayer, cultural expression, and the universal call to evangelize. The response was overwhelming. Youth from countries like Vietnam, Sri Lanka, Malaysia, Indonesia, Singapore, the Philippines, and India eagerly embraced the initiative, each group contributing their unique cultural expressions. Through traditional dances and powerful prayers, the youth reflected on the themes of the novena, each representing St. Alphonsus's life and mission.

One of the key themes of the novena was that evangelization is the mission of every Christian, not just a few. The cultural performances went beyond being artistic expressions; they were living prayers, demonstrating the youth's commitment to spreading the Gospel, inspired by St. Alphonsus's spirit. As they reflected on how to evangelize in a secular world, serve the marginalized, and embrace intercultural ministry, the youth prayed for the strength to bring the Gospel to society, echoing St. Alphonsus's belief that "The greatest work we can do in the world is to lead souls to God." Their performances reflected their dedication to this call, striving to bring the message of Christ to those most in need. Another central theme was the call to serve the marginalized. As St. Alphonsus famously said, "There is no greater love than that which a person has for the poor." The youth embraced this principle, incorporating it into their performances and prayers, reminding us of our duty to serve those on the margins, as St. Alphonsus did throughout his life. The novena was held online and reached an even wider audience, with over 24,000 viewers engaging with the event. The youth's performances transcended borders, uniting people from across the globe in prayer and faith. Inspired by St. Alphonsus's words, "The harvest is great, but the labourers are few," the youth understood that evangelization is a global endeavour, with each person called to share in the mission of spreading the Gospel to every corner of the world.

The themes of social justice, innovative evangelization, and the lay missionary vocation further inspired reflection and action throughout the novena. The youth brought their unique perspectives and creativity, contributing to a celebration of unity in diversity. St. Alphonsus's reminder that "To spread the love of God is to give life to others", was brought to life through their energy and dedication. This global novena demonstrated the power of youth united in faith, reminding us that the mission of the Church transcends borders. - 2) Intentional Courtship Stage "They need to see the wholeness of you".
- 3) The Engagement Dialogue with Family and with God.

Each episode kept our online spectators on the edge of their seats until the very end.


Each game features four interesting rounds, including multiple-choice questions, dumb charades, rapid fire round, and the exciting emoji round.




>>> MARY'S MANTLE : DRESSING IN DEVOTION

The Feast of Our Lady of the Rosary in October was established in 1571 by Pope Pius V, later extended by Pope Clement XI. The Marian month honours Mother Mary for her protection of the Church, by the faithful praying the Holy Rosary. Mary, our Mother was involved in the mysteries of Christ.

We at RMC, came up with a unique concept -Mary's Mantle (Dressing in Devotion) for young girls to don the cape of Our Lady; A distinctive and enriching way to lead us in devotion, prayers and enlisting the messages delivered by Mary.These messages addressed in native languages, often promulgated an image of herself that incorporated elements of the local culture. With this theme – dress in one of the apparitions/titles of Mary for girls aged less than 16; Participants were to choose one of Mary's listed titles given, be creative with costumes and props giving them an opportunity to wear Mary's Mantle, be it through a photograph or video with audio.



There was a rustle at RMC with parents grabbing popular titles/apparitions such as Our Lady of Lourdes, Fatima and Akita and few picking the lesser known. Rules were relaxed allowing more participants to don similar mantles. Young viewers showcased their devotion through their talents. Creativity was at its best, with participants using props, bringing life to the rich legacy of faith, love and grace.

The overwhelming responses and chatter online post the Rosary, exhibited the enthusiasm of the viewers, from the first day with Our Lady of good voyage (led by Amelia D'mello) and concluding with Our lady of Assumption (led by Praisy Pinto). Each participant lived up to its title. TRIDUUM & NOVENA OF ST. GERARD MAJELLA

Fr. Ivel Mendanha CSsR, General Consultor, had a unique approach to presenting this years' Triduum, giving us a new perspective of this much beloved Redemptorist Saint.

The General Consultor looked at the tenents of religious life – the vows of Poverty, Chastitiy and Obedience – first, as defined in the Redemptorist Constitution and its statues. He then explored three-four essential dimensions of each virtue, elaborating on how St Gerard lived them to the fullest in his life; setting an example for generations of his congregation "as a Missionary of hope in the footsteps of the Holy Redeemer".

St. Gerard's natural love for the poor and suffering, the abandoned widows and orphaned children, the sick, especially in the Hospital of the Incurables, Naples and during the vicious famine in Southern Italy in the 1750s, exemplified his vow of poverty "as he offered them the hope of the Redeemer."

The purpose of chastity, The People's Saint discovered, was so that he could consentrate with unwavering focus on Jesus the Redeemer and His mission. This Redemptorist Brother "lived his vow of celibacy embracing the life of Jesus, a pure selfless love."

The very heart of the vow of Obedience is "uniting one's own will with the will of God'." St. Gerard's life ambition was to live that to the fullest

and he is said to have chisled on his door : "Here is one who does the will of God as God wills and for as long as it pleases God." Such was his fervour that apart from living the Redemptorist rules, St. Gerard wrote his own personal rules, about 50 of them, for his life.

The Triduum culminated in the feast of this much loved Redemptorist Saint with an explanation of his four loves: Love of the Crucified Lord, of Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament, Love of the Poor and for Mary our Mother. St Gerard truly lived the call of the Gospel.

A Life of Prayer and Hope: An Interview with Sr. Lucy O.Ss.R.

The Redemptorist Media Center team was honoured to host Sr. Lucy Conway O.Ss.R., a Redemptoristine Nun from Ireland. Fr.Charles Vijay Kumar C.Ss.R., Director, Redemptorist Media Center, had a heartwarming conversation with his esteemed guest, offering us a deeper understanding of the monastic life within the Redemptoristine community in Dublin, Ireland.

Blessed Mother Maria Celeste Crostarosa was the founder of the Redemptoristine Nuns (O.Ss.R). She and St. Alphonsus Liguori, the founder of the Redemptorist Fathers (C.Ss.R), knew one another back then. They both share the same spiritual mission, to preach and live the message that "In Him, there is plentiful redemption."

The Redemptoristines have been in Ireland since 1859. The community in Ireland consists of 15 sisters from various countries like Scotland, India, America and England.

Sr. Lucy Conway O.Ss.R. highlighted that Redemptoristine life is centered around prayer and service. To sustain their monastic life and support their community, the Redemptoristines dedicate themselves to the humble yet sacred task of making altar breads, or communion hosts. That being said, their work doesn't end here. They engage in many other acts of service with humility and selfless devotion.

Sister Lucy explained that they live their lives to be a "living memory of Christ," that is "being Christ to one and another." Their retreat center was described as an "oasis of hope and peace and solitude" for visitors.


St. Cecilia's Christian Music Festival Fostered a sense of Faith & Unity Through the Power of Music
